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## Leading Characters




#### PHILIPP NICOLAI

Nicolai was born in 1556 in Hesse, Germany, and was a pastor of many churches before settling in Westphalia. In 1597-1598 the plague took the lives of many of his parishioners. In response to the events Nicolai wrote a series of meditations, *Mirror of Joy*, in which he included his two most famous chorales: "Wake, Awake, for Night is Flying" and "O Morning Star, How Fair and Bright."

#### JOHANN HEERMANN

Heermann was born in 1585 in modern-day Poland. A sickly man, he faced many trials throughout his life, including a throat ailment that took away his ability to preach while being a pastor. He also survived multiple Roman plunderings. He used his tribulations to write numerous Lutheran hymns about the confidence that faith gives.





#### PAUL GERHARDT

Gerhardt was born in 1607 near Wittenberg, Germany. He studied theology in Berlin, becoming a pastor and beginning to write hymns, many of which were well regarded during his time. Facing many trials throughout his life, Gerhardt lost his pastoral position and his wife and four sons in the middle of his career. He still went on with his compositions, creating over 133 hymns, many of which are still beloved by Lutherans today.
